## PART I

- 01. Explain briefly two specific examples from your experience to support that Educational Psychology has been beneficial for you to understand the behaviour of students in your classroom.
- O2. Select any one method that is useful for a teacher to study student behaviour and give two examples to explain its' uses to improve the teaching-learning process in the classroom.
- 03. Discuss the relevance of Maslow's theory to explain motivation of students towards learning.
- 04. Name and explain three characteristics of an individual which are determined mostly by genetic factors.
- 05. List the three stages of development introduced by Bruner and explain how a child represents his/her experiences to himself in relation to any of the listed stages.
- 06. Explain the two concepts "growth" and "development" with reference to suitable definitions.
- 07. Explain with suitable examples, how reinforcement can be used to shape one's behaviour.
- 08. Name and explain briefly the two mental processes that would take place in an individual prior to giving meaning to his/her experiences.

## PART II

- 09. i. Explain a theory that would help a teacher to understand the thought (cognitive) process of students in the classroom.
  - ii. Select any two steps in the thought process and explain the role of the teacher in facilitating the two steps selected.
- 10. i. There is a close relationship between maturation and learning of a child. Explain this idea with suitable examples.
  - ii. Name three different areas of development and analyze how satisfactory development in each area could bring about favourable impacts on the other areas.
  - iii. Highlight two important environmental factors that have an important bearing on the development of a child and explain their impact on development of children.
- 11. Select either 'Childhood' or 'Adolescence' and answer the following questions.
  - i. Discuss the crucial changes (three each) that are taking place in an individual in relation to cognitive and social behaviour of the selected stage.
  - ii. Select one change from each aspect of behaviour (cognitive social) and explain the role of the teacher in facilitating those changes.
  - iii. Discuss the problems (three) that you would face as a teacher when performing the above role/s in relation to your school context.

  - ii. Use of experimental methods to study child behaviour
  - iii. Techniques that can be used to facilitate transfer of learning.
